





Cut one side of the puppet, trace and cut the other, and then connect them












The three puppeteeers must run constantly to make the flying bird fly. It needs to be made of very light cloth in order to fly right. It is improved by having plenty of fringe. Remember that people will see both the top and bottom of the costume


### **Backpacks and Puppets**




Because the upright lies against the spine of the puppeteer, the backpack puppet follows the movement of the puppeteers but magnify them. This natural-looking movement makes them very good for dancing and interacting with people. They can shake hands, bend all the way over, and hug people.









### **More Backpacks**





There are various ways of giving puppets shape and concealing the person inside. Puppets shaped by arms and shoulders tend to move more energetically, and puppets shaped by hoops tend to look more funny and frivolous.









Most of the dragon costumes are a simple long strip of coth with fringe and decorations to conceal the shape of humans and hoops

















**Balance:** To make a puppet taller than 12 - 15 feet tall, you need more leverage than you can get from a backpack or by holding a pole. You can handle this either by weighting the bottom of the puppet (for instance, by putting them on a cart, or by raising the point of balance to the center of the puppet with a tripod.








### **Hoop and Cloth Puppets**

These puppets are made like hoopskirts, with heavy wire (9 or 12 gauge) or plastic irrigation tubing running through seams in the cloth. They can be large because they are very light. They can be stored flat with the hoops collapsed, or folded with the hoops removed. Make the hoop structure first, then measure and sew the cloth, remembering to leave room for the hoop seams.












### Foam






Make a cardboard or paper pattern to follow, then sew foam pattern pieces between pieces of cloth, or glue them together. Foam puppets are sofy and comfortable and their faces can be distorted to change expression



### **Plaster Casting**


Plaster casting is useful for mass-producing puppets. Vaseline, then papier-mache into the negative, then pop the mask out when it;s dry



### Banners

Picture for banners may be cut from masonite like giant woodcuts; in this case the pieces are inked separately and then assembled and the cloth is dropped on them, Fast!


Or cut a giant stencil out of heavy plastic and run a paint roller over it. Again, the colrs can be separated. Ink and print on different tables. spread clean paper between each print.

















The box is most suitable for backpack and other puppets where the head is not attached to the costume, and where you will want to remove it for transport.







### Costumes



Make a circle around yourself with string to decide the width of the costume. The length is from 6" below the head to just below the knee



Costumes: It is important that costumes be made of lightweight cloth. If the cloth is light enough it may be possible to see out of it. If not, insert light curtain cloth into the costume to make a viewport, or conceal holes in the pattern of the cloth. Fringes and draping are useful in giant puppets in general; they conceal the simplicity of the shape and add to the movement.





